The poet Mary Oliver writes in "Wild Geese":

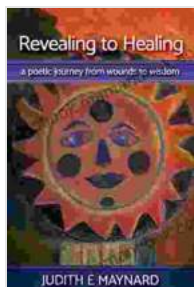


“You must not ever stop being whimsical. / And you must never, ever give up.”

May this article be a source of comfort and reflection as you travel your own poetic journey from wounds to wisdom.



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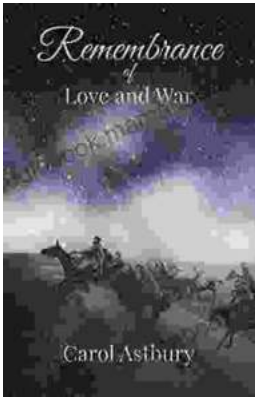
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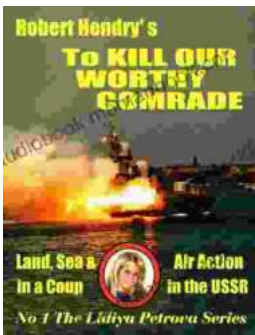
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
