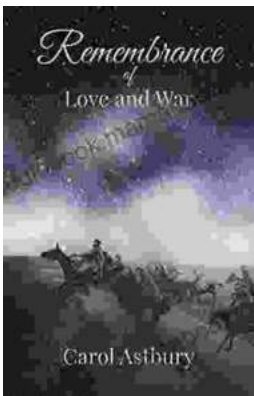
Gerda Weissmann Klein passed away peacefully at her home in Phoenix, Arizona, on April 2, 2022. She was 97 years old.

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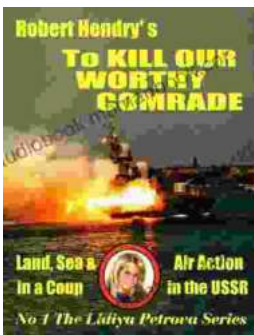


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
